Church Family,
I know how much each of us cares about the life and condition of FCC. Thank you for all your prayers, expressions of unity, and willingness to be flexible in the past couple months. The love we have for God and each other has been on full display. I'm writing you with a few updates.

Summary:

- Beginning **Sunday, June 7th, 2020** our **Parking Lot Service moves to 9:00 AM.**
- We are making plans to include an **11:00 AM Sanctuary Service**, but are not ready to commit to a start date yet.
- FCC is strong and still relying on God and on **each of our involvement and assistance.**

With the summer heat coming, I'm pleased to see us move our time Parking Lot Service to 9:00 AM. While we continue to meet safely, most of us have gotten more comfortable with the worship and fellowship outdoors. While it is not ideal, this service gives us the ability to gather, sing, remember the Gospel, and learn from the Bible. Our attendance has been outstanding and, as many have told me, it is the highlight of countless peoples' weeks.

The 11:00 AM Sanctuary Service will be scheduled after (1) we see a discernable trend of the virus decreasing in Lubbock County, and (2) when our staff and lay leaders feel competent in our plans and preparations. According to research, apart from long term care facilities, congregational worship is the greatest gathering of at risk people, age-wise. It is tempting to compare ourselves to businesses or other churches, but our leadership believes in patience, prayer, and wisdom that God promises to give. It is only logical to confess that whatever we do is either going to be an over or under reaction; only God is perfect. The hope we have is not in our ability to do things perfectly and timely; our hope is in God who promises: *"Whether you turn to the right or to the left, your ears will hear a voice behind you, saying, 'This is the way; walk in it'" (Isaiah 30:21).*

Many pastors are fretting from the pressure they're under in leading this decision, along with their lay leaders. In my case, I have felt nothing negative or mean-spirited from anyone in the church. While I feel the strain that is natural in leading decision-making during unprecedented times, I am only experiencing support and advice from the members of FCC. For this I am full of gratitude! The love in this church is divine and God blessed.

The Sanctuary Service would offer several benefits: the sacred space we miss dearly; the altar; musical offerings from Daryl on

the organ; the chance to be out of our vehicles and seeing each other more easily. There are some temporary restrictions, however. Given the CDC's spacing recommendations, our sanctuary could hold approximately 100 people. We would prepare Kuykendall Hall with chairs for overflow with a livestream. Research indicates that singing could be a high risk activity, especially in large groups. Therefore we will most likely discourage congregational singing. Masks coverings will be encouraged. We will include the lyrics of hymns in our liturgy, and highlight instrumental hymns. Ushers will be utilized for spacing; entrance and exits will need to be done in an orderly fashion. Communion will be done spiritually and not physically for now. Offerings will be received upon exiting the sanctuary. Childcare is not available at this time.

It's not hard to see that this also is not ideal. The Sanctuary Service should bring peace and comfort to many even if it's not all the way "normal." In the same way, we have grown and glorified God in the abnormality of the outdoor service.

In addition to your prayers and continued support in presence and financial contributions, I do ask one more thing. Please keep this historic moment from being politically divisive in the church. The divide of our nation persists in these days. The health of FCC and our witness for Jesus is best when we leave partisan politics out of the conversation. I've been the pastor at FCC for nearly 6 years and am grateful to see that even the most politically involved members, put the Christian faith and religion first.

Many in the nation are obsessed with our President. Whether for him or against him, the masses watch carefully and respond to every move. As Christians our passion is with Jesus Christ. We pray for the President, as we did the one before, but our chief focus must remain on the Lord and the reason He has called us by name. There are many Americans looking for answers today. People are having their souls moved by the nation's crisis. All of them need Jesus Christ. Think, therefore, of the church as the medic's tent. Along with the Holy Spirit we lift high the cross, live by grace, and put the Gospel first, that many more would know the love of Jesus.

This is our time to shine and continue the path which began, not just in 1901, but in the 33 CE when Jesus ordained His church to preach to the nations.

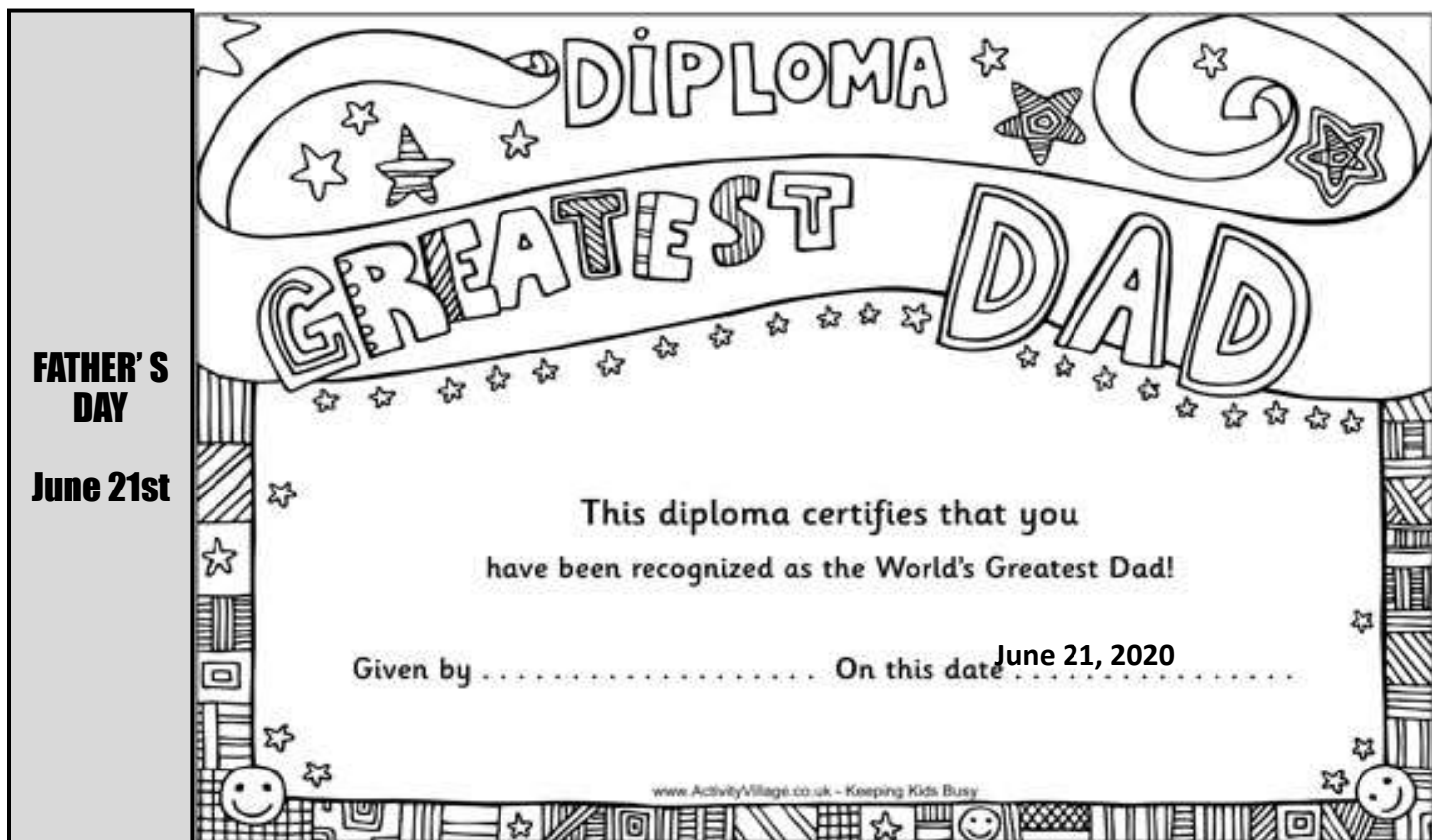

Ingredients:

- 1 cup Judges 5:25
- 1 1/2 cups Jeremiah 6:20
- 2 Job 39:14
- 1 1/2 cups 1 Kings 4:22
- 1 teaspoon Luke 13:21
- pinch of Leviticus 2:13
- 1/2 teaspoon Exodus 30:23
- 3 cups of Psalm 25:7
- 8 oz 2 Samuel 6:19
- 1 cup Song of Solomon 6:11

Directions:

Melt Judges, add in Job and Jeremiah, mix together and set aside.
In a separate bowl combine Kings, Luke, Exodus, and Leviticus. Fold them into the first mixture.
Add Psalms and mix well.
Lastly, stir in Samuel and Song of Solomon.
Drop by tablespoon full onto lightly greased cookie sheet and bake at 350 degrees for approximately 15 minutes.

In the Life of the Church

When Dr. Dudley Strain officiated at the funeral of Mollie G. Abernathy on Sunday, June 5, 1960, the service commemorated a remarkable life – and the end of an era in the history of the church. Mollie was the last surviving charter member of the First Christian Church and the last living student of the first class at Add-Ran College in Thorp Spring, Texas, known today as Texas Christian University.

Mollie Davis Wylie was born in 1866 to a ranching family in Hood County, Texas where she married James W. "Jim" Jarrott in 1886. In 1901, The Jarrotts led several pioneer families to the plains and settled west of Lubbock. Jim was murdered on August 27, 1902, in an apparent attempt to force the settlers off of their land. It failed. All of them remained and Mollie managed her ranch alone. Jim's murder remained unsolved for thirty years.

In 1905, Mollie married Monroe Abernathy, Lubbock County Justice of the Peace and a civil engineer. Together, they were instrumental in the growth of the church and the city. They were instrumental in bringing the railroad to the area, built landmark buildings in downtown, and donated the land for McKenzie Park among many other achievements. At the time of her death, Mollie was survived by two of her four children, five grandchildren, nine great grandchildren, and one great-great grandchild.

Bean Elementary / Good News Club Update/ Overview by Marcy Lawless

As is obvious to everyone, the 2019-2020 school year came to a close in a most unexpected and unprecedented manner this year, bringing an abrupt ending to our ministry at First Christian Church's adopted school, Bean Elementary. Although the spread of the COVID-19 virus was beginning to increase as the children departed for Spring Break on March 13th, no one could have imagined that there would be no return to classes, no more interaction with our lunch buddies, no more Good News Club meetings, no Teacher Appreciation week luncheon or 5th Grade Graduation Banquet. Many concerns and countless prayers have been shared ever since, but we also want to take this opportunity to praise God for the many ways the mission & ministry to/through Bean Elementary and the Good News Club have been fruitful this year.

First, a note of explanation about FCC's involvement at Bean. There actually are two separate missions of outreach at the school: 1) FCC's **Mission of Adoption of Bean Elementary School** and 2) FCC's **Mission of Evangelism through the Good News Club** which is held at Bean. Below are the ways these missions are expressed through various programs and events.

FCC's Mission of Adoption

The 2019-2020 school year was the fourth year for FCC's involvement at Bean as our adoptive school, seeking ways to minister and extend Christ's love to the children, teachers and staff. Bob Lawless is the Bean Elementary Adoptive School Mission Chair and relies on many FCC volunteers and supporters to carry out the following areas of ministry:

Annual School Supply Drive (July-August): The Church's generosity is shown during the school supply drive each summer, and last year was no different, with an amazing assemblance of items from Bean's request list, plus monetary gifts that allowed the purchase of even more to fulfill the many needs of the teachers and children. Prayer with Teachers: Coordinated with Principal Thomas, dates and times are set aside so that the FCC pastoral staff and various volunteers are able to gather and pray with the teachers and staff each six-week period.

Balloon Arch for the Start of School: The Yates family donated a red carpet during the second year of school adoption—a wonderful gift that is rolled out on special occasions at the school, including the first day of school. For the second year, we also supplied a beautiful balloon arch for the children to walk through as they came back from summer vacation on August 14, 2019.

Lunch Buddy Program (Dave Bender, coordinator): Every year, volunteers from FCC meet each week for a 30 minute lunch period, one-on-one with children who have been designated by teachers as needing extra support and attention. Although this occasionally includes a bit of academic assistance, the true purpose is to give love and encouragement. FCC had 15 volunteer lunch buddies this past school year.

Raised Garden Project (Dave Bender, coordinator): During the first year of adoption, the Men of the Church assisted the school in putting in a watering system for several raised beds so that the children could have the experience of growing vegetables, plants and flowers. Regrettably, the overall project has languished due to the lack of extra time and oversight needed from the teachers. We remain optimistic that one day, this will be a viable addition to curriculum.

Fall Festival: Holly Jessen coordinated with teachers at Bean to plan a parking lot "Trunk or Treat" from First Church for the past two



years. The Fall Festival is well attended by the children and their families, and we had 12-14 cars lined up with assorted candy and treats last fall. We hope to find a new coordinator of this project for the coming year.

Christmas Book Project: Each year, funds are raised in October/November to order and purchase (through the LISD at their pricing) pre-selected books, as determined by the teachers of each grade level. Every child at Bean Elementary, from Pre-K through the 5th grade, receives a book at their respective Christmas parties—a total number of around 525 books last December. Not only has the congregation been generous in underwriting the books but many members come together to enjoy a “wrapping party” in early December which is a fun family event, complete with cookies and hot chocolate. Members also are invited to come to the school to deliver the books to each classroom during the Christmas parties.

Valentine’s Day Dental Bags: Thanks to Arlano Funderburk, our focus at Valentine’s changed from FCC bookmarks and suckers the first two years to bags of dental items including a new toothbrush and toothpaste the past two years—obviously needed after all the candy! These are bagged with a card from the FCC family and distributed during the Valentine’s Day parties, and we thank Dr. Robert Grimes, DDS & FCC member for gifting all brushes and paste for this project in 2020.

5th Grade Awards Banquet: In 2017, 2018 and 2019, FCC hosted the 5th Grade Awards Banquet (luncheon) in Kuykendall Hall for students and their families. Regrettably, the 2020 banquet was scheduled for May 18th and could not be held. It is tradition to give each student moving on to Middle School at double-walled tumbler on which is printed: “First Christian Church congratulates the Class of 2027!” (the current class’s projected graduation date). We have these cups on hand and may be able to distribute them during a summer event that the Bean administration is hoping to hold in July or early August. Bibles are also available for students to take, and in the past, almost every child wanted one.

Student Birthdays: Neon-colored “Happy Birthday from FCC” pencils are given to every student on his/her birthday throughout the year.

Teacher Appreciation: We established a “Teacher Appreciation” committee with representation from FCC Sunday School classes and this past school year, it was

headed by Beverly Shaver from the Seeker’s Class. We recognize the teachers with various treats (prepared on rotation by the classes) each six-week period; gifts for their birthdays (this year, a devotional that the teachers really liked); Christmas gifts and a Teacher Appreciation Week luncheon (typically prepared by FCC member, Tom Johnson) during National Teacher Appreciation Week in May. All was executed except the luncheon and in its place, we gave each teacher a gift card to Menchie’s Frozen Yogurt.

FCC’S Mission of Evangelism through The Good News Club

2019-2020 was the second year for FCC volunteers to lead a weekly after-school program to bring the good news of Jesus to registered children in the Bean Café. Marcy Lawless is the Mission Chair for The Good News Club, and she and Bob Lawless are the Co-Team Leaders for the club, with Beth Wright serving as the Administrative Coordinator. Add to those an amazing team of 10 volunteers, including Dave & Dawn Bender, Brittney Hardin, Brenda Hendricks, Carla Holt, Tom Johnson, Pam Patton, Bev Shaver, Julie Swindle and Marilyn Wragg! Each 90-minute club meeting is packed full of learning, action and fun and includes small group time with Table Shepherds; songs, with motions; a Bible lesson; a Mission lesson; Wonder Time; and review games. Average attendance was around 25 children each week and God showed up in big and small ways. We completed three six-week lesson series before Spring Break: *The Life of Joseph, The Life of Esther, and Jesus: God of Power and Glory*, and we were embarking on *The Ministry of Paul* before our plans came to a halt

Given the length of this report, there are just two pieces



which, hopefully, reflect the depth of what these children learn and take with them, the first from a mother of two sisters in the program who sent this edited e-mail a couple of weeks ago:

Bean Continued....

“The girls are doing great. They pray to the Father every meal and before bed. Karina really misses y’all so much. She has still been reading the Bible and going over a lot of the same material. You all have made such a big difference in my children’s lives. Thank you for the time you have spent. . .it is truly amazing what they have learned.”

The second is a memory from the year submitted by GNC volunteer, Tom Johnson:

My favorite memory from the 2019-2020 GNC sessions was during one of the Question and Answer Games when the six Bean Elementary Groups were divided into two teams and answering questions about the lesson

The lesson was from *Jesus: Gods’ Power and Grace*; The score between the teams was tied and Mr. Bob asked a bonus question: What is Gods’ Plan for Mankind?

If I only had had the camera running when 2nd Grader Kenzii answered the question in her sweet little tiny voice saying, “God sent Jesus to save us from our sins!” – I can’t decide if it was Mr. Bob, Ms. Marcy or Ms. Marilyn or the other Shepherds that had the biggest smile in the room.

Probably was Jesus – who always let the “little children come to me.”



Christian Evangelism Fellowship (CEF) training and leadership is providing help to all the adult leaders and children. **It is working--** the **Word (Bible)** is being taught, the **Gospel** is being presented, **God is being glorified** and the children are having **fun**. If every child at Bean can give that answer, our work will be completed there and we can start with a new school year or another school. Did I miss anything-oh yes- the adults in the this GNC at Bean Elementary are seeing the fruits of their work for the **Lord** and both the adults and children grow in **Christ** each day. This is the purpose of **Good News Club**.
