## A Message From Rev. Carpenter

ne of the signs and symptoms of being a Christian is repentance. Others include the list of the fruit of the Holy Spirit (Galatians 5:22-23), a high esteem for Jesus Christ, an interest in God's revealed truth, and a love for God and for neighbor. Joy-based repentance is a sign and assurance that a Christian listens to God and is eager to adjust to truth. That being said, I have been experiencing my fare share of repentance lately. Frankly, I've learned to love it.

Most recently it had to do with praying. I heard a teaching that said, "Why do we pray because we are worried or afraid? We should most often pray because we believe!" Any prayer in faith is a good prayer, but I'm guilty of not only praying out of worry, but also encouraging others to prioritize this type of prayer. Again, it is always good to pray in all circumstances, but is fear-based and worry-based prayer the best and preferred way?

The scriptures say that all creation (including the things that worry us) is like the grass of the field. "The grass withers and the flower fades...but the Word of the Lord is forever (Isaiah 40:8)." In addition Jesus repeatedly tells us to not worry and to not be afraid. In the end, the only reality will be what God has promised; everything else will become untrue.

This may sound like simply semantics, but I think it's worth saying: many times we build our prayers around the temporal conditions around us, as opposed to building them around the eternal conditions set by God's Sovereign Word. Temporal problems and conditions are things like sickness, loss, financial stress, lack of meaning in life, disappointment. When we get that bad news or are discouraged by a hard day, by the time we get around to praying to the Lord our souls are crushed and weakened. We look to God to solve a temporal problem, so that we're restored to our condition before this most recent crisis. Again, those prayers are heard and received, but is this is the best way?

Recently, I wrote down the promises of God that are the most vivid and clear to me:

- God will be glorified and He will appear with weight.
- God's Word is forever and secure.
- God's Son has satisfied God.
- The name of Jesus is the authorized name.
- The Holy Spirit is inside every Believer and testifies to our spirits.

**Psalm 1 tells us that the blessed man/woman is the one who delights in the Lord's** Word and who meditates, muses, and recalls the Promises of God day and night. Blessed is the one who prays because they believe and who speaks to God while **standing on God's promises. In addition to the universal, biblical promises, God may have given you a special "wink" or word through signs and dreams. If you're sure it's** from God, then speak to Him about how you believe Him.

I am convicted to pray more in delight and excitement about what God has promised. We know that faith, not prayer, moves mountains. Will we pray with faith regarding the things God has promised?



## To Pray in Jesus' Name... Marilyn Wragg

Most of us learned from our earliest prayer experiences to end with, "In Jesus' name. Amen." I had previously concluded that to pray in Jesus' name entails praying selflessly, in obedience, and in love. It means praying in accordance with God's will and in light of God's character, as revealed in His Son Jesus. While these are all true, they present an incomplete picture. Through studying chapters 14–16 of the Gospel of John, my understanding of what it means to pray in Jesus' name was expanded.

As Jesus' disciples struggled with His declaration that He was going away, Jesus told them it was for their good, because the Holy Spirit would not come unless He left. Jesus also told them that, after He returned to the Father, they would no longer ask things of their earthly Rabbi. Rather, because they loved and believed in Jesus, they would ask the Father directly in His name.

My new understanding is that my entire relationship with my heavenly Father, including the privilege of directly approaching God in prayer, is grounded in my belief in the Person and the atoning work of Jesus Christ, the Son of God. Jesus came from the Father, and when He returned to the Father, He sent the Holy Spirit to indwell believers.

That means when I pray in Jesus' name, I affirm my belief and stand on every promise of God that is "Yes" in Christ (*2 Corinthians 1:20*). I pray not only with Christ's Spirit now residing within me, but also with Christ Jesus Himself interceding for me at the right hand of God the Father (*Romans 8:34*).

Join me in reflecting on this truth and these scriptures. Thank God each day for sending the Spirit of Christ to live with and in us. And remind yourself often that praying with genuine faith "in Jesus' name" adds power to your prayers beyond all that we could ask or imagine (*Ephesians 3:20*).



## Remembering FCC Member, Truett Tyler...

## Truett Tyler

Truett Tyler grew up on a farm near O'Donnell, Texas, the youngest of four brothers. (One of his brothers died in 1932 at age 7.) Truett graduated early from O'Donnell High School at age 16. He watched both of his older brothers go off to war. One day, while hoeing weeds, his dad suddenly asked him if



he would like to go to college and offered to pay his way for one year.

He started Texas Tech in the fall of 1942, but attended for only one year. Truett followed his brothers' example and enlisted in the Army Air Corps in April, 1944 in Lubbock. He was sent to Amarillo Air Base for basic training. The young man had dreamed of flying ever since a childhood experience on a carnival ride shaped like an airplane. However, by the time he was ready for flight school training, the demand for bomber pilots had declined, and he became part of a flight crew that worked on small trainer planes.

He was sent for additional training to Stockton, California, then was transferred to Carlsbad Army Air Base which was a bomber training school. His assignment was to score bomb hits by the trainees. He was then transferred to Lowry Field near Denver, Colorado. He was doing clerical work and reported that he "obtained the speed of 60 mistakes a minute". In spite of his "mistakes", he became a

typing instructor. The military needs all kinds of skill. Truett was discharged from the service in November, 1946.


He returned to college and went into the ROTC program and was commissioned a second lieutenant upon graduation in 1949. He declined his commission and went to work at

Westinghouse as an Industrial Engineer. He had a variety of jobs over his career including a stint at General Dynamics in San Diego, and retired in 1986. As he grew older, Truett realized how much he missed West Texas and moved to Wolfforth.

Truett is a patriot who values the contribution of all veterans. The story of his brother's service, in particular, is one he wanted to tell. His brother R.L. joined the Army Air Corps in Lubbock before WWII began. He trained at March Field in California and was sent to Nichols Field in the Philippines in 1940, where he was trained to be a radio operator. However, a Japanese attack was imminent and R.L. became an infantryman to help defend the island. He was transferred to Bataan where 74,000 Filipino and American servicemen held out for over three months against the invading Japanese. R.L. was captured on his birthday in April 1942. A few days later the men were forced to begin the grueling 90-mile journey which is now known as the Bataan Death March. Thousands lost their lives because of brutal physical abuse and merciless killing. R.L. survived the horrible experience, but succumbed to malaria and died at POW Camp O'Donnell in July 1943. His remains were never recovered.

Truett travelled to the Philippines in 2001 to pay his respects to his missing brother and his fellow missing servicemen.



## Lubbock A-J Remembers: Lubbock's Charles Baldwin

saves only best memories

"Charles Baldwin, fisherman and World War II fighter pilot, clings to the good memories. He doesn't consider himself a hero, but undeniably, he was a talented combat pilot in 1944.

"There are a lot of civilians that did a heck of a lot more than I did. Everyone pulled together," he said of the war years. He remembers leaving the University of New Mexico to sign up for cadet training, and was called to active duty in January 1943. Baldwin, who at 95 has the appearance of someone 25 years younger, doesn't concentrate continually on sorrow. His wife passed away in

"Seven years ago, he was attending a school reunion at Lamesa and was talking with a group when someone spoke to a woman named Myrna by

using the wrong last name. Her husband had passed away. She tactfully replied that she answers to any name, and Baldwin had said spontaneously, 'What about Baldwin?'" He analyzes that often:

"You know, I didn't say that. It came out of my mouth, but I didn't say it. I didn't even think it. It just popped out." Still, the seed was planted: "We fell in love."

They married a year later.

Myrna said, "We have had six wonderful years together."

Baldwin talks of their new beginning:

"People need to realize — it's not all gone," he said.

"You can cling to sorrow, or you can learn to dance again.""
