As you come to Jesus, the living Stone rejected by humans but chosen by God and precious to him – you also, like living stones, are being built into a spiritual house to be a holy priesthood, offering spiritual sacrifices acceptable to God through Jesus Christ. For in Scripture it says: 'See, I lay a stone in Zion, a chosen and precious cornerstone, and the one who trusts in him will never be put to shame.'''

1 Peter 2:4-6

God's activity in your personal life reveals the health and strength of our church family. All of us matter and as we each persevere in our faith walk, we become a "spiritual house" together. I hope you have the benefit of hearing and seeing how God is working in the lives of people you love, especially in your church family. We see the grace and love of God in people growing through pain, confronting personal sin, and courageously transitioning to new jobs, new cities, and unknown futures. We see miracles, relationships reconciled, and a genuine hunger to know and enjoy the Word of God. I'm writing this month to encourage all of us to do our part to travel down the narrow path (Matt 7:14), and allow God's purposes to shine through our lives. Here are three things I focus on when submitting myself to God's hand:

- God is real. The Book of Job ends with "My ears had heard of you, but now my eyes have seen you (42:5)." One day we will see the very things we have faith in – the Father, the Son, and Holy Spirit, and all the heavenly host. We will see glory so bright that it makes the sun look dim. God cannot remain an abstract idea, a philosophy, or simply a worldview. He is real and will be known. As we grow in our walk of faith, let us confess, "Lord, I know you're real, and I want to experience your presence in my life."
- God is love. "Anyone who does not love does not know God, because God is love (1 John 4:8)." The purposes of God are based on His eternal love for us, and though the path of life may lead through pain, the valley of the shadow of death, or the way of the cross, we can be assured that each

step is for our good. The opposite of love is neglect, and God will never forsake us or the work of faith He began in us. Authentic love includes truth and discipline. Hebrews 12:10-11 puts it this way: "God disciplines us for our good, in order that we may share in his holiness. No discipline seems pleasant at the time, but painful. Later on, however, it produces a harvest of righteousness and peace for those who have been trained by it." As we continue down the path of life with God's loving, fatherly hand, let us confess, "Lord, I trust your love and purposes for me; please finish what you started in me."

Prayer is vital. References to prayer and fasting saturate the Bible. In short, a person who knows they need God, prays. A person who doesn't acknowledge their need, doesn't. We should all be aware that our worst days of the faith are when we neglect prayer and scripture study. When will we learn? If you're having trouble praying, begin by considering your dependence on God's grace, power, and wisdom over your life. Think your thoughts with Him and ask Him to show you what to think about; ask Him to reveal to you what season of life you're in and what He is doing in you. As we trod down the road of holiness, let us confess, "Lord, I am weak but you are strong; I do not put my hope in my strength, my wisdom, or my goodness. I put my hope in your Son, Jesus Christ. Keep me near you in prayer, and change my heart so that I want to spend more time with you in secret."

We are all stones who now cry out, "Jesus is Lord!" I'm honored to journey with you all.

Thank God for Dwelling in You ... Marilyn Wragg

I recently encountered the following question: How can you be sure God dwells in you? I immediately thought of Bible verses that provide a "right" answer. But I sensed the issue was not so much what I know about Scripture as what I have taken to heart. *Am* I sure God dwells in me?

Honestly, I had to admit that I question at times whether God—the Holy Spirit—actually dwells in me. Sometimes it sure doesn't feel like it. And never does it make worldly sense that He would. I have little control over pesky doubts like this popping into my mind. But I can control how I respond. And for this specific doubt, I respond with two steps:

- Pray the following, based on Ezekiel 36:26–27: Thank You, God, for putting a new spirit in me. Thank you for putting Your Spirit in me. Even when I do not feel it, I choose to believe Your Spirit dwells in me. Please fill me this day, so I can better follow You.
- Ask God to help me recall the many things I could not have done or known or weathered but for His indwelling. As I remember, I am convinced He always has and always will dwell in me.

So, I ask you the same question: Are you sure God dwells in you?

If you are a believer in Christ, you can be assured that He does, and He always will. How about we get the jump on any pesky doubts by thanking Him each morning for putting His Spirit in us. *Thank You, God for dwelling in us.*

In the Life of the Church by Deborah Bigness

This month we celebrate Memorial Day and all those who have served our nation in the armed forces – and remember. In June 1941, the congregation publicly announced the construction of a new church at Broadway and Avenue X. The bombing of Pearl Harbor, Hawaii on December 7, 1941 changed everything.

Only the education building, the fellowship hall (also used as the sanctuary), and a large open room enclosed by a temporary wall could be built with the materials already

purchased. The congregation employed all of its resources to aid American war efforts. The former church building at 16th and Avenue J was used for Red Cross work and the WPA sewing circle. The large open room was used to entertain student pilots from the Lubbock and South Plains Army Air Fields. The dream embodied by the architect's original drawing would have to wait until the war was over.








Some of mine include praying before all meals, always being available for people during their times of crisis, and always washing my hands after entering a restroom. It is truly weird that within our psychological makeup we tend to hold on to these, often self-made but often beneficial, convictions.

While living in America, I have been dealt a huge hand of privilege; the privilege of religion, the privilege of self-differentiation, the privilege of extensive choice, the privilege to choose between fast food restaurants during lunch. I pray that we hold on to the relationship we have with Jesus more dearly than we do the self-made convictions that we always execute. Following Christ in not a trend or a fad, following Christ is a conviction to life. May we treat every single day with this reality in mind. My prayer for those of you who have read this is that you be wildly convicted to follow Christ. Even when it's hard, even when it's easy, even when your life is threatened, even when you have every reason not to follow Christ, may you be convicted of the path of eternal life known as Jesus Christ.

"Above all else, guard your heart, for everything you do flows from it." Proverbs 4:23




